Can we see your numbers!

Did you know that our code of ordinances requires that your house numbers be posted and be visible from the roadway? Not being able to see your address makes it really hard for first responders who are trying to locate your residence. While many of us may know where you live keep in mind that many times emergency responders may be coming from other jurisdictions. We recommend 4" tall numbers with a ½" stroke. While our ordinance only covers inside the city limits we strongly suggest that regardless of where you live you post a visible address, it is even more important in the rural areas.

<u>Equipment Spotlight</u> It's a LASER Gun!

We have used LIDAR (Light Detection and Ranging), also commonly called LASER, for many years as a speed enforcement tool. It uses a form of pulsed laser to measure ranges. Unlike RADAR which shoots a wide beam, LIDAR pin points the exact target and provides not only the speed but also the distance. LIDAR is not vehicle mounted, the units available are all handheld. Just another tool we use to help keep the streets safe.
